It's not Easy Being a TEACHER

One Day Suddenly, I realised that teaching could not be about the subject I was teaching but it had to be about the

students. I gave myself an ultimatum. I needed to be there for the students or leave. I started viewing myself as a teacher who is performing the role of a leader and whose job is to direct, structure and channelize the course work to its fruition. With continuing years, the pedagogy has changed. I have now started believing in contingent approach to teaching contextually dependent on the stakeholders of my class room. With every student, there is a different kind of teacher emerging inside me. I agree that it is a tough profession and not truly acknowledged by society and family. But, at the same time, it is a role of shaping future generations and I love my contribution to the society. Being a teacher is not easy and it is not smooth sailing. It takes years of personal and professional struggle to decide on it as a vocation. We need a conversation that balances how difficult teaching is as a profession and why people stay in it. Honest conversations about why we come to this profession and what decisions we make that keep us there.

Teaching means that you have an emotional investment in making our world better, and you use your skills and gifts to achieve that within your own classroom. You see each student as unique, and you realize that his gifts are special and deserve to be developed and celebrated. Teaching is a tough but rewarding career, but when we start doing it voluntarily for the upliftment of the society it becomes more a path of self satisfaction than just monetary happiness. Kindness, confidence, strategic thinking, and inner joy are the four factors that turn classrooms into places where kids feel inspired, happy, and confident. Whether they remember minor details about the 'Periodic

Table' in Chapter 3 of Science text book, doesn't matter in life. Their confidence and joy for learning matters. Students are drawn to enthusiasm and catch it. They appreciate passion and kindness and genuine interest.

Appreciating differences, respecting the dignity of each student, and accepting responsibility that a student's failure to learn is the responsibility of the teacher are the necessary building blocks of creating a teaching-learning relationship with students. The greatest joy in teaching is to facilitate that "ah-ha!" moment when a student realizes that there is a new truth or understanding that resulted from their interaction with their teacher. A teacher must be dedicated to the notion of change. The essence of education is to reveal the unknown by either breaking a set and looking at something in a new way or building upon previous knowledge and experience to seek greater understanding and truth.

However, to achieve all these there are several challenges that a teacher has to face especially when teaching, as a part of social service, which doesn't earn us anything but self-satisfaction. I am here to pen down some of the major challenges that we all face each day. The Challenge of Behaviour Management - This is possibly one of the most significant challenges I faced as a beginning teacher in Pathshala and I still find it a constant challenge as I get to know the intricacies of each child and work towards bringing out their best. Next is the Challenge of Differentiation - Classes are made up of students with differing interests, abilities, skills and knowledge. For this reason, one-size-DOES-NOT-fit-all. Teachers face the challenge of meeting the variety of needs they are confronted with. Hence to conclude, you take students from where they are now to where you want them to be.



—HP Pathshala—PLANTATION ACTIVITY

A unique fortnight plantation drive was mooted by one of the volunteers of Team HP

Pathshala, Mrs. Uma Bala Prasad. She not only mooted this idea, but lead it to make it a grand success. Her team planted around 100 plants/saplings during this time frame, which sensitised the students on the importance of Plants, soil and environment conservation. Thereafter, a stall was also put up during HPNE New Year Celebration Week by Team Pathshala, to showcase these personalised plants and raise funds for Team Pathshala through the sales proceeds. The kids manned the stall giving them a different kind of exposure in salesmanship and presentation.

Here are some excerpts of candid talk with Mrs. Uma Bala Prasad (UMP) taken by Mr. Ankur Maheshwari (AM).

AM: Madam, how this idea of Plantation came to your mind? What was the genesis?

UBP: Nowadays outdoor activities have reduced in school curriculum and students are getting drifted away from nature. Being a botanist, I noticed this during my Pathshala classes. I got an idea of introducing Plants to them through Plantation activity.

AM: How did HPNHC support you in this endeavor?

UBP: With everyone's appreciation, the idea was put forward for HPNE Admin approval. They not only approved it but also encouraged us by providing all needful. Old plastic pots, which were lying around as waste, were cleaned and reused for growing plants. HPNE office provided us some plants from its nursery and few were donated from my garden.

AM: How many students of Pathshala were involved? I mean any specific class.

UBP: Around 100 students participated from HPNE and HPNW Pathshala. Class wise, we divided them into groups. Each group of students was given hands on experience with soil and plants. Different propagation methods were taught to students with explanation on organic and chemical fertilisers, pesticides & their effects on environment.

AM: What was the impact on students?

UBP: Students not only had hands on experience of soil and plants but also learnt new Japanese Plantation technique KOKEDAMA.

AM: Mam, can you pl. elaborate on this technique?

UBP: This is a special method of growing plants in moss ball, first developed in Japan. Now it became a popular growing technique all around. It has an advantage of using them as decorators on tables & we can also hang them to improve the aesthetics. This became the highlight of the event later.

AM: Are there any other items included in this activity?

UBP: Encouraging the students towards sustainability, we collected waste glass and plastic bottles, dry coconut shells etc. and transformed them into beautiful plantholders with personalised designs and colours.

Children were also trained on how to do conversations with residents/visitors about plants during the stall. All these activities helped them in overall development of their personalities as well.

AM: What was your overall experience of this unique idea? Do you intend to take it forward?

UBP: Our Stall received accolades from all around for effective execution of the entire idea. Visitors complemented the event as an exemplary, eco-friendly and encouraging towards sustainability. One of the residents mentioned "Infusing Plantation, Gardening, Salesmanship, training, grooming is wonderful."! I thank to Pathshala team, friends and well-wishers in making this event a big success.

Now our Pathshala surroundings are beautified with the plants and children are taking care of them on continuous basis.

CHIT-CHAT WITH VOLUNTEERS BY ADITI AGARAWAL(AA)

When I spoke to these inspirational volunteers of Pathshala, it gave me more insight what it is like to dedicate few hours of our life for children who need us the most.

AA: What was your inspiration to join Pathshala?

Sharda: When I got an opportunity to help kids in to making their future, made me say an instant yes to become a part of Pathshala. I got a chance to use my education apart from teaching my own children and helping someone else's kids grow.

Usman: Teaching has always been my passion. I will like to share with you, my own education was done in breaks, starting from SSC in 1986, HSC in 1998, graduation in 2004 and finally my Post grad in 2012. Hence, I think I understand the importance of education in true sense. Spreading knowledge among kids is a fulfilling experience.

AA: Have you volunteered anywhere before or have any experience in teaching?

Sharda: Oh yes! I was a lecturer in Modern College in Vashi somewhere around 2004, before that too, I was teaching in Maharani Laxmi Bai Govt College in Dhabi near Gwalior. Do you know it is the same college in which Shri Atal Bihari Vajpayi studied. (smiles)

Usman: Yes me too.. I taught young kids in Junior High School, interesting fact about that school is that it was opened by own English teacher so I volunteered there as an English teacher.

AA: How different is the teaching experience in Pathshala than your own kids?

Sharda: We know our kids since birth. we understand them, taught them have from day 1 from very basic. While Pathshala students first time come here in 4th/5th standard. To teach a 5th class student very basic is a big challenge. So, in the first year I ensured strengthen the basics of any subject,

and in my second year at Pathshala, I see difference in the students, they have gained confidence to speak in class and we can teach syllabus and chapters along with other things.

Usman: My daughter was in KV (Kendriya Vidyalaya) the approach in the school is very different, it wasn't about grades in her school, the teachers in school were nice mainly they encouraged reading books which is really important. While in Pathshala, students were not able to read questions so solving or answering them was far-fetched. I tried inculcating reading habits in students teaching grammar and vocabulary so they benefit from it in all subjects.

AA: Does being a volunteer here looks like a long term commitment for both of you?

Both: We enjoy it because we do not look

for any benefit from it. Sometimes it does become difficult because of personal work and exigencies. But we are not going back. As long as we are in this colony, being a part of Pathshala is integral for us.

AA: What do you remember about your first day here?

Sharda: It was on 9th Dec 2017, with some 10-15 kids. It was a different feeling sitting in the AC room near the HP Nagar West canteen. In- fact if you know, we also taught for few days in the nearby school as volunteers and finally we had our own Pathshala.

Usman: For me it was not just the first day, but lot of background work from reaching kids, talking to parents, visiting nearby 'bastis'. All these memories will always be cherished.

AA: In percentage if you can say, how much improvement do you see in students from the day they started?

Sharda: There is tremendous improvement in few kids which I am sure will go a long way in their career ahead. I remember, one girl would not speak a word in class who now participated in the elocution competition organized by us. I feel really proud of each student.

Usman: Improvement would be difficult to be measured in percentage. Most importantly kids have learnt in Pathshala mannerism, discipline, respect for elders... they have come out of their shell of bring an introvert and shy kid to a confident student. Majorly this has happened because here they all were given equal love and attention irrespective of their caste, creed and looks.

AA: Will you like to share some amusing experience that you had with student?

Sharda: There were so many, difficult to say one. But since Usman sir is sitting here.... I will like to share one. When we were practicing group song for the Annual Day celebration, they would get little nervous as Usman sir would enter the room and students sing in some amusing tone totally out of 'sur'. (laughs)

Usman: Well.. you know tenses in English Right!, I teach them tenses using family tree like past tense is Dadaji. Students laugh a lot during this class and we have learning with fun. (smiles)

AA: What do you think one should have... may be as a skill or attitude to become a part of Pathshala?

Sharda: I feel if each of us enjoy doing this service and at the same time have commitment to do it, that is all. One should feel it is their own work then only one will be able to manage his/her own time and fit this in the schedule. Most importantly self-inspiration is the key.

Usman: I think self-less attitude and readiness to give back to the society is really important. Secondly, they should not have attitude of Eliteness atleast when they are teaching the students. They should not feel; they are doing any kind of favour to someone but instead be self-motivated.

AA: Lastly, what changes Pathshala has brought in your life since you both have been part of it since its inception...?

Sharda: It has given me recognition and self-satisfaction. People now know me and when we all volunteers meet in gatherings, we have so many experiences to share and talk about.

Usman: I wasn't known in the corporation among so many employees before. Now

everyone knows me, even the management at higher level recognizes me as a volunteer associated with West Chapter of Pathshala. And ofcourse, whenever I go to take class after office hours, the twinkling of eyes washes away all tension and stress.

AA: What was your inspiration to join Pathshala?



LP: After Engineering, teaching was known to me. I liked it then too. After my husband got transferred, we moved to HP Nagar East, and I came across this email for sharing knowledge with kids from underprivileged society. Also, my own daughter was going to Delhi for higher studies, so I had to fill-in time with an opportunity to make new friends in new place. I would say everything just fell in place.

AA: Have you volunteered anywhere before or have any experience in teaching?

LP: No, I don't have any experience in volunteering before. Though, after engineering from NIT Raipur and MBA, I started teaching in management college. Honestly, it was way simpler to teach there as they were elder students and more serious about career.

AA: How different the teaching experience in Pathshala than your own kids?

LP: It was so simpler to teach her, her school was helpful, she would herself do the homework. She was not that naughty, sincerer so it was only about monitoring her. It is not so here, it is not about kids but the fact that students need conducive atmosphere to grow and they are not that blessed.

AA: Does being a volunteer here looks like a long term commitment for both of you?

LP: Yes, of-course, till the time we are in HP Nagar, I will continue to be a part of this too. I look forward to it during the day. Sometimes I feel it is the only productive work I do during the day. (laughs)

AA: What do you remember about your first day here?

LP: I remember it so vividly. It was raining that day and we were sceptical about how many students will come, but it was an overwhelming response. All kids had different things in mind. We listened to them, understood their expectations to decide how we want to take it ahead.

AA: How far do you think we have come in this journey?

LP: Now I know my students, I know their names. We have a time table and classes

are more organised. We are in a more comfortable position. It was an experiment before and now we are starting to see results.

AA: Will you like to share some amusing experience that you had with student?

LP: Many things happen every day that tickles our mind whenever we remember them. But more than that, the love and respect we get from students is beyond every other experience. Like, on Teachers day they got flowers for me, hand-made small cards and then they wish and touch our feet for blessings. When I was teaching in college before, no one cared for these things but here they actually treat you like a Guru and we feel that we are doing something right for sure.

AA: What do you think one should have... may be as a skill or attitude to become a part of Pathshala?

LP: Patience to deal with disparity among students as they all come from different schools and language of each student is also different. We cannot be hard on them. Teaching with cool mind and having a passion to teach at the same time.

AA: Lastly, what changes Pathshala has brought in your life since you both have been part of it since its inception...?

LP: Now we have an emotional attachment and bond. After my daughter moved for higher studies, I had that emptiness which was filled by being with these kids. All the volunteers here are like family, we discuss, share our experiences and learn from them.

What was inspiration to join Pathshala?

SK: The concept of Pathshala itself is very inspiring. For

any society to prosper, education is the basic requirement. Everyone wants to live in happy, prosperous and educated society, so I am. It is needless to say that our society includes all the people with whom we interact everyday. So I decided to join Pathshala.

Have you volunteered anywhere before or have any experience in teaching?

SK: As such I do not have significant prior teaching experience, however, I used

to teach some students in my hometown whenever I used to go there during my college days' vacation.

How different the teaching experience in Pathshala than your own kids?

SK:I have just 3 years old kid. So, it's not much teaching at home.

However, I would like to say that teaching experience in Pathshala is just amazing. It's not just teaching but interacting with kids on various things. There is lot more to learn also.

Does being a volunteer here looks like a long term commitment for both of you?

SK: Yes, and No.

Yes, because there has to be some

commitment when teaching in Pathshala. Every Sunday, I have to reserve my 2 hours (10-12). I cannot schedule any other thing during this time unless it's very urgent.

No, because I do not think about long term commitment. Right now, I am able to contribute and will continue to do so.

What do you remember about your first day here?

SK: I still remember that on the first day, I was teaching just a 4 years old kid. That time, there were only few kids coming to Pathshala at HPNW. I was teaching him very basic thing like numbers, etc. Getting the concentration of the kid was difficult.

In percentage if you can say, - how much improvement do you see in students from the day they started?

SK: It is difficult to quantify but I would say, there is significant improvements in the kids. It's not just about marks in examination but there are various other aspects such as confidence level, stage speaking, general knowledge, etc.

Will you like to share some amusing experience that you had with student?

SK: I have made bonding with the kids of class 8 in HPNE. They have become my friends. There was sports meet in HPNE for Pathshala kids. I was encouraging class

8 kids and giving them some tips for 100m run (saying that I ran in some marathons). After completion of the run, one kid challenged me to compete with him. I knew I won't be able to compete with him due to two reasons, one, he was thin and quite younger to me, and second, there is difference in marathon and sprint running. I was trying to make some excuses but he was not budging. Then I told as I am wearing jeans today, I won't be able to run, we will run some other day for sure. Till now, he continues to ask me to compete with him and I continue to make excuses.

What do you think one should have... may be as a skill or attitude to become a part of Pathshala?

SK: Many of us teaching here do not have prior teaching experience. But, we are trying our best to teach and learn teaching. Skill can be developed, the only thing required is our desire to teach.

Lastly, what changes Pathshala has brought in your life since you both have been part of it since its inception...?

SK: It gives me self-satisfaction that I am utilizing some of my time for the society. Whenever I talk about this to my family members, they encourage me and tell me that they will also try to do something like this. It gives good feeling inside.


Mode of instructions in a classroom of diverse students

Pathshala is part of my life.I thank HPCL who gave me such a great opportunity.


Personality of a Good Teacher
